Dear Friend of the Club,

I am so excited to share our 2023 Impact Report with you. This past year was transformational for the Club and launched us into a whole new era for our mission to serve youth in Benton County. Since the founding of the Club in 1991, the Club has shown steady growth, adding a unit every few years, slowly increasing the number of kids served each day. However, in 2023, in partnership with the Rogers Public Schools, the Club opened 14 new school-based sites in elementary schools across the district, more than doubling the number of kids who walk through our doors each day after school. With growth comes challenges but with the support of an incredibly talented and passionate staff, a dedicated board of directors and amazing donors and sponsors, we were able to make the impossible happen.

At the Club, every day is different. We cover different lessons, run new programs, and practice new leadership skills. But it's more than that. We take time to listen to the kids, ask them questions about their day, how their new-found friendships are going and how well they did on a recent test in school. Listening helps us get to know each kid as an individual **so that we can find the best way possible to serve them.** All of this leads to emotional stability and a feeling that the Club is a fun, safe place to be.

I am proud to announce that in 2024, the Club is starting a new youth mental health pilot program called "Mindful Matters" in partnership with the University of Arkansas School of Social Sciences and a local mental health provider. This new, multi-faceted program will train our staff to recognize the signs of mental trauma and will provide on-site counseling and therapy free of charge to our families. I know that this program will transform the way we serve our children and put them on a path of success both at home and at school.

You need to know that none of these amazing services would be possible without your generosity. Your direct financial support makes our motto of "Great Futures Start Here" a reality. To illustrate that point, 54% of Boys & Girls Club Alumni across the country state that the Club saved their lives. It's people like you who make that happen and I cannot thank you enough.

DC Trip

Two of our Club teens, Kayleigh and Holden, got invited to attend the Summit for America's Youth in D.C. They were the only youth that represented the State of Arkansas. They were able to meet with state representatives and congressmen to share what the Club means to them, discuss issues youth face, and share their platform on food insecurity and generational trauma. They also had an opportunity to explore monuments, memorials, the White House, and the National Museum of Natural History!

Programs/Athletics

In 2023, we were able to offer multiple programs, like Money Matters. This program is where kids learned the importance of and how to save & budget money, set short-term & long-term goals, differentiate between wants & needs, and how to avoid bad debt. SMART Girls, a program dedicated to empowering young girls, imparts essential lessons on navigating peer pressure, fostering a healthy body image, cultivating friendship skills, and so much more. We also held summer sports camps, and had great success in our Basketball, Flag Football, and Volleyball seasons!



Cox Innovation Lab

The Bentonville Club held a ribbon-cutting for the new Cox Innovation Lab! Cox provided a \$20,000 grant for the Innovation Lab, which included: new state-of-the-art laptops, upgrades of internet and electrical wiring for eSports, 3D printers and coding for robotics, custom art and tables designed by local artists along with new carpeting and paint, and making the labs adaptable for an outside experience.


United Federal Credit Union's Partnership
